A mid morning break allowed time to speak to others, having badges with our names was a good idea, I'm sure I am not alone when I say peoples names never stay in my memory for very long!

Back to learning and for this session Christina had us all up and doing the silly walks. It was a really good way to show us how construction of the body frame makes a big difference to movement. We had pantomime cows, high kicking hackney steps. It was great fun and much laughter had by all.

Lunch followed, which was really tasty, and more hot drinks. Lewknor village hall is an excellent venue with such a good kitchen, large indoor space and plenty of parking and all the outside space for dog walking.

Our afternoon session was the Eurasier Breed Seminar and our speaker was our own Brigitte Mordan-Grimm. Brigitte has a lovely speaking voice. I couldn't believe that this was her first solo performance on these seminars. She was very informative, provided plenty of slides and allowed us time for questions and answers through her talk.
